Tulianne's article in the December Shape **J** about the change in worship times for AVUCC has resulted in several people commenting to me their concerns about the proposed changes. I have been very much impressed by the thoughtfulness and honesty in those comments. I want to emphasize that the change in times is not set in concrete and is not a "done deal". Julianne's article was the beginning of discussion and dialogue between our two congregations. I believe that if we are to make decisions which benefit both congregations and leave both in a win-win position we need to talk, we need to consider, we need to understand each other, we need to cooperate and we need to learn to work better together. What I believe is that HOW we make this decision is much more important than what decision we make. There are some serious concerns that need to be addressed before a change in worship times would be acceptable, but long after the dust has settled over what decision was made, we will still remember HOW the decision was made and that process will be a precedent for future decisions. Is each congregation going to make unilateral decisions without regard to the needs and concerns of the other? Or are we going to learn to live and work together in a spirit of harmony and trust? Both congregations are strong enough to survive either way, but I believe life will be much more pleasant if we can strengthen and support each other. The deep truth I want each member of ECA to realize is that much of our success depends on having the strongest AVUCC possible. Our youth programs, our Sunday School all depend on the ability of AVUCC to attract children and families just as their success depends on

I will not promise to agree with you, but I will promise to hear and prayerfully consider what you have to say. I will also promise to be as honest with you as I possibly can as to what is happening. News from the Front

Humanity, Serving Humanity

When I began shaking the hands of volunteers, and looking into the eyes of those who are served at Santa Maria Urban Ministries, I knew I had a lot to learn. And yet, I felt right at

Lawrence Robles, Santa Maria's Director, recently shared, "The underlying mission at Santa Maria is really very simple, as a concept. We seek to make Jesus Christ a living presence by offering to all a safe place of welcome, service and positive transformation—when proper reflection and illumination is applied to the activities and events of this ministry, we come to recognize the presence of Christ."

Santa Maria, located south of downtown San Jose, is supported by the diocese of El Camino Real. It serves a diverse community of people in need, primarily Hispanic and Asian, by providing food, clothing, pre-school, English and computer classes, and a caring place to go if one is feeling lonely or hopeless. Although residence in certain zip codes is required for obtaining services at Santa Maria, no one is really turned away. Emergency food boxes and supplies are offered, and referrals to other charities are given to those not residing in one of the service zip codes.

I have had the privilege of teaching English as a Second Language (ESL) at Santa Maria since September. When I first started teaching, I was nervous. How could I communicate with my students with only a few partially retained (at best!) Spanish classes in my background? I eventually found some Spanish/English dictionaries to be helpful, but mostly I found the real desire of my students to learn English the most helpful thing of all. My shortcomings did not bother them a bit. I taught them English, and they taught me Spanish. We learned, and are learning, together.

There are many ways to help at Santa Maria. In addition to teaching ESL, I register clients at the front desk and sometimes sort food. Plans are well underway for a medical clinic and an immigration counseling center. If you feel a pull toward this kind of outreach, the best thing to do is visit Santa Maria between 9 a.m. and 12 p.m. The address is 778 South Almaden, San Jose. If you want to call first, the number is 292-3314. The ever patient Mr. Robles will give you a tour of the facilities and guide you to a volunteer opportunity that fits your particular talents. Financial donations are welcomed as well.

In our current political climate, it is encouraging to be part of Santa Maria Urban Ministries, where every human being is treated with dignity and respect, regardless of gender, age, nationality, employment status, sexual orientation or religious affiliation. It is humanity, serving humanity, at its best. Visit, and experience for yourself.

REPORT FROM JV BOARD OUTGOING PRESIDENT OKUMURA...

The year is coming to a close, and my tenure as your JV Board president will soon be over. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the Joint Venture Board members and our clergies, Julianne Stokstad, Stephen Mills. My gratitude to pastor Nolan Redman for all his 17 years of wonderful work prior to his retirement in July of 2002 and God bless Ann.

During the past year we did have some turbulent times but with great deal of candor, patience and thoughtful consideration your Board has rallied through these adversities and subsequently made good decisions for the benefit of both churches. That is the strength of Joint Venture to share, study and assimilate great talents and maximize their efforts.

Your Joint Venture Board has worked diligently to improve the status of our facility. It is aging, and consequently requires a great deal of work to keep your Church looking good and functional. Long Range Planning Committee uncovered varies needs that required attention and prioritized them. Quality work was necessary but we also had to be fiscally responsible. The three major concerns were, 1) Fix the leaky roof. 2) Get the Termite problem under control 3) Paint the Church-inside and out

The leaky roof has been a chronic problem for many years despite numerous attempts to fix it. The major goal was to find a system that would assure of a warranty that will give us adequate protection. After a thorough investigation, Dinyari "Astec System" was selected on the basis of their experience of sealing 200,000,000 sq ft of roofing over the past 15 years. Our research revealed them to be meticulous in their work and very reliable. The roof was basically sealed on November the 5 just before the first heavy rain storm and it survived the onslaught without a leak. So the first test was satisfactory but we will test it again as another storm front moves in. Our roof is guaranteed for 10 years and can also be renewed for additional 10 years for much less cost. We did spend a great deal of time, effort and money on this venture but I am certain that it will be worth the effort in the long run. They will also do an annual inspection of the roof to identify any problems and fix it as necessary as part of our warranty.

Termites: Problem is currently under control: a) The subterranean termites which has been treated locally in the past, do recur. Currently Terminix has plotted 57 pods around the church, which are baited and progressively eliminate the family of termites. This is an on going project, and if during the course of the treatment any damage that occurs will be repaired. b) Swarming drywood termites have been a problem for many years in the sanctuary. After a very thorough study the only effective form of treatment was to fumigate the whole church which was accomplished October of 2001. So far it appears to be effective.

Painting of the Church: A great volunteer force from both Churches and led by our Facilities Chairman Bob Green.

Managed to paint the wood trimmings of the outside of the church in May and in another great Joint" Venture Work Day" in September the entire outside walls (stucco) was painted in record time. Truly a remarkable accomplishment by a dedicated group of volunteers. The inside of the church walls has also been painted at various time.

Other activities in which the JV Board has been involved include trimming of the large trees with the help of a tree surgeon, cleaning the furnaces and replacing filters, pipe for gas feeds was assessed, elevator problem was corrected, John Hawes has taken over the security system, adding of additional shelves in the fellowship hall closets courtesy of Jan and Al Day.

We will more than welcome your service. At the beginning of the year each JV Board member was assigned a special task for which they were held responsible. Each member assumed their responsibilities and fulfilled their obligations. More interest was created and consequently much more work was accomplished.

Budget is the key responsible work of the Joint Venture Board. The Board must carefully scrutinize all expenditures, evaluate all necessary work that needs to done, and keep the cost at a reasonable level, so that it will not burden the Churches, yet must have adequate finance to maintain our growth and promote activities in music, education, youth group.

Despite accomplishing a great deal of work this year, we made certain that our Capital Reserve and our Operating Reserve (Savings/Checking) are well maintained. Capital expenditures can be used in future years provided the money is returned in a given period of time so that we will always have adequate reserves to meet emergencies.

Over the past year we were able to fulfill our major goals, with a good working Board's participation, and with support from the enthusiastic voluntary workers which is the key to a successful Joint Venture programs. However, there is a great deal of work to be done on a short and on the long term basis. Many of the old Board members well be retiring this year including Bruce Bush, Bob Green, Diane Smith and Dick Okumura from AVUCC and Amy Griffith, Roger Hoyt, Ken Pittroff from ECA.

It has been a pleasure working with these fine people and I would like to thank them for their efforts and congratulate them on their accomplishments. No doubt they will be replaced by very able members from both Churches that will continue to do great work led by Allan Jones, our President-Elect for the coming year.
