I feel sorry for people who come to church only on Christmas and Easter. It seems to me that these occasions lose their impact unless you get the flavor of the events leading up to them. How can you possibly appreciate the full force and impact of Christmas without the season of Advent to prepare for it or how can lose yourself in the awe and wonder of Easter without experiencing the trials and tragedy of Palm Sunday and Good Friday. It is like watching only the last out of an exciting and hard fought baseball game and trying to capture the excitement and enthusiasm of the entire game from that one play. Or perhaps an analogy would be only seeing the final kiss of a romantic film and thinking you could understand all the joys and heartaches of the romance that led up to it. So too with Easter. I would invite and encourage all of you to come to as many of the services as you can so you can understand the unspeakable love of God for us manifested so thrillingly in Easter.

On Palm Sunday (April 1), assisted by the Folk Choir, we will begin with all the excitement and joy of Jesus triumphal entry into Jerusalem. We will wave our palm branches and hail him as our Messiah. But we will watch our hopes turn to despair as the religious authorities convince the Romans to arrest and crucify Him.

On Maundy Thursday (April 5th) at 7:30 p.m. we will eat with Jesus and his disciples at His Last Supper and experience the agony He undergoes in the Garden of Gethsemane and pour out our grief through the service of Tenebrae. This is a joint service with AVUCC and will feature a joint choir presentation.

On Good Friday (April 6th) we will witness Jesus death on the cross at noon with the Good Friday Liturgy and experience the full force of the tragedy as we walk the Via Dolorosa (the way of the cross) through the Stations of the Cross at 1:00 p.m. in the tree lot.

On Holy Saturday (April 7th) a number of Episcopal churches will gather at 8:00 p.m. at Trinity Cathedral in downtown San Jose for the Great Vigil and First Eucharist of Easter. The Rev. Canon Sheldon Hutchison, will preach and Bishop Romero will preside. This will be a Rite II Choral Eucharist with baptism, and confirmation.

On Easter Sunday (April 8th and for the seven Sundays after Easter) we will, at last, experience the joy of the resurrection as we journey to the tomb with the women and find it empty. We will then contemplate what this might mean in our lives

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From the Editor



When the Vestry asked me to write about growing up at ECA I drew a blank. I suddenly realized that though I have spent 24 years at ECA I was unsure if I remembered any of it. The most vivid memories I have are either very recent (post college) or quite early (rugrat). After thinking on the topic for some while I am still unsure if I can do the topic of ECA's growth over these past 24 years any justice. I recall (just barely) being baptized by Father Mike, I only recall it because my brother and I were rather old for an Episcopal baptism, the result of my mother and father searching for a church that was "just right" for many years. My mother was raised a Catholic and my father was raised in the Methodist tradition. Naturally the Episcopal church lay in-between as we are Catholic-lite (all the ceremony, only half the guilt) and the Methodists are Episcopal-lite (all the guilt, half the ceremony), but I digress. After an exhaustive search (many hours in a late '70s Oldsmobile station wagon) we somehow ended up in Almaden at ECA one Christmas eve, this was especially odd since we lived about 15 miles away in Evergreen apparently the Yellow Pages led us here. Apparently something about ECA really enchanted my parents because we ended up coming back. I recall that as a child I felt it was rather an ordeal to be at ECA, never knowing another church I didn't really realize that the lunar landing module was an odd shape for our denomination, nor did I realize that it was odd to co-own the building with AVUCC. Of course at this time there was no joint Sunday school, it took place during the service. During the summer children were just left to their own devices in the pews. Without the benefit of "busy boxes" we were just left to crawl [tumble] from on row to another, or fight behind the last pew. Sometimes we'd sneak out all the prayer books from one section and trade them with the hymnals from another section. (If you ever arrived and the prayer books were conspicuous by their absence, the kids probably did it). I recall rather well Susie Ferguson and Penny Sabin teaching some of the Sunday School classes I had, and I'm sorry to say that to this day I still haven't memorized the books of the old testament (sorry Susie!)... More next month.

KIDNEY: HELP NEEDED PRONTO

One of our parishioners, Marion Grunge (pronounced Grun – jay), known for her quick wit and quiet wisdom, is in line for a kidney transplant – imminently. Because she lives alone, her doctors require that she have a support system in place before they release her to receive a kidney. They want specifically: names, addresses and phone numbers. We, this ECA church family, have a chance to proclaim Christ's love to Marion and others by being a major part of her support system.

We are in the process of lining up to 24 persons who will take turns driving Marion from her home off Blossom Hill (near Beswick Drive) to University of California San Francisco Medical Center. The first drives will be for pre-surgery, scheduled appointments. Then comes the unknown time to drive up for the kidney transplant; this drive will be day or night at a moment's notice. Following the transplant there will be scheduled drives up to San Francisco for follow up appointments. There may also be emergency trips concerning rejection of the kidney.

We will provide each volunteer with maps and directions to Marion's house and to U.C. S.F. Medical Center. You will have Marion's cell phone #. We will make up a chart for each volunteer to sign up for when they are available. We want to arrange for back up volunteers so there are no glitches. The whole program will be overseen and supported with prayer.

We need you to call Sandie Mueller (997-1642) or Kelli Casale (323-1669) or the church office (268-0243) and give us your name, your phone number

and your cell number and your e-mail address (if you have one.) We will contact you and find out the dates you are available for the next four months. We will do this for four months at a time.

Stewardship

Following are Stewardship Reminiscences from Romer's Roamin' Relationships, Relatives, Recovery, Rocks, Reservations, Rivers, Roads, and Railroads. Our first planned stop on our odyssey was to attend Matt Bamberger's (Nancy's nephew) Boy Scout Eagle Court of Honor in Sierra Madre on March 3. The event was filled with family and friend support and celebration of a long dedicated beginning of a life of service to God and community. We stayed with our long time friends, Skip & Bobbi Arjo, in Upland, CA. Bobbi and I were friends in junior high, high school, and college. We worshiped at the Arjo's church (St. Mark's in Upland) on Sunday. Sunday late afternoon while shopping together, Bobbi experienced a massive hemorrhagic stroke. Because of eMails from friends and family some months ago we were keen on simple tests to detect a stroke. We rushed her via their car to their local hospital which quickly recognized her symptoms and admitted her to emergency care. As we contacted their daughters, friends, their St. Mark's care community, and business associates, she underwent CAT and MRI scans. The bottom line is she is home now and recovering with complete use of her limbs and speech but with severe short term memory loss. She tires easily but is slowly gaining stamina. We stayed an extra day until Skip assured us that family and St. Mark's care community network ramped up. We continue to check in on progress from the Road and pray for her continued Recovery. Please pray for her.

Our trip resumed, visited relatives in Phoenix, saw the Giants beat the Angels as they Reconstruct a team from aging players and a new manager, stood "on the corner in Winslow, Arizona" and visited the Canyon de Chelly near Chinle. In Chinle after

a 6 hour 4 wheel drive in a 50's troop carrier up the massive Rock canyon, we attended a Navajo Nation Pow-Wow. Wow! It was so wonderful to see the caring and celebration of the Indians, some as young as barely walking to, well , barely walking, as they danced in fully colored tribal dress. They truly celebrate scarcity among God-given riches.

On the way to the Ruins of Mesa Verde, we worshiped at St. Barnabas in Cortez, CO. The Rector is the Rev. Erika Meyer, who visited ECA a number of times many years ago when she attended CDSP and remembered us. When she arrived at St. Barnabas 5 years ago, they were in danger of closing the doors. They are on the road to Recovery, celebrating scarcity.

We rode the Rails of the Durango & Rio Grande Western Railway. What a trip! We went up the Rock canyon along the Animas River on the narrow gauge train and marveled at the sights and precipitous cliffs we rode hundreds of feet to the River below. Durango comes together twice a day and stops what they are doing to wave with smiles as the train goes by.

We then went on to Taos and then Santa Fe and on to Albuquerque where we Renew friendships. We are struck with the scarcity on the Reservations and the celebration of God-given riches in caring and sharing much the way ECA does. Our Renewal will come from Recognizing our riches, rejoicing in our Recovery by Caring and Sharing with our friends and neighbors, and inviting them to come to ECA in the weeks and months ahead. God Bless you from the Road.
