

Father Frankly Speaking

have brought to conclusion the great cycle of the Church year which began last December with Advent and then progressed through Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, and Easter. Now begins the great – perhaps long is a better word for it – season of time after Pentecost extending all the way to next November when the liturgical year begins anew with the First Sunday of Advent.

In some Church circles, the season we now enter is called "ordinary time." I suppose this is to distinguish it from the string of extra-ordinary events in the life of Christ and the Church recounted in the liturgical calendar from Advent to Pentecost. After all, not much happens during the time after Pentecost. There are few, if any, great feasts or fasts of the Church. And, the liturgical color remains standard-issue green for months on end.

Still, the time after Pentecost has always been a good opportunity for study and reflection in the life of the Church. And that is significant. For, while folks sometimes tease that Episcopalians do not read or study the Bible, the reality is that our worship is firmly grounded in Scripture, and never more so than in the time after Pentecost. This year, in our Sunday lessons for example we will be reading the Gospel of Luke pretty much straight through. Ditto for several other books of the Bible, including various letters of the New Testament. Call it our summer reading program. So while these months are sometimes thought of as down-time at Church, they are anything but that.

Ordinary time may have another sense to it as well when we consider that we are today still living in the time after Pentecost – quite literally. Let's see. If the original Pentecost occurred about the year 33

AD, that would make about 1977 years of Sundays. So, if my math is right, we have already surpassed the one hundred-thousandth Sunday after Pentecost. That's a lot of ordinary time in the ordinary lives of ordinary people like you and me.

But that's also a lot of sanctification. Some pretty extraordinary things have happened during these ordinary times. Great saints have inspired us with their learning and holiness, for example. Important movements and reforms have arisen in the Church. Bishops, rectors, and interim ministers have come and gone at thousands of cathedrals and churches near and far. And, you and I have been baptized, fed at the Lord's Table, and lived out our lives and common faith together.

Not bad... For being so ordinary.

Truth is, nothing is ever really ordinary about God's plan for us. Not our birth. Not our life. Not our work. Not our family. Not our death. As humorist Garrison Keillor might say, we are all above average, every last one of us. In everything we are and do, we share in the life of God.

And that is pretty extraordinary, if you ask me.

So as we enter our liturgical ordinary time, listen carefully to the story of God's extraordinary love for us as recounted week after week in Scripture. God's amazing work of salvation is not over. And, celebrate the ordinary in your own life, knowing that the extraordinary gift of God's love is yours in ordinary time and for all time.

onday, May 10, 2010 was a day of distinction for the Episcopal Church in Almaden! We were notified by Canon Brian Nordwick from the Bishop's Office that we were officially in the search step for ECA's sixth rector. The timing of this was slightly ahead of our projected time line! This is the first major process in the search journey and was made possible because so many people contributed their time and talents. Once again, thank you. Everyone can be very proud of the search website and have confidence it will help lead our next rector to ECA.

The Search Committee is hard at work developing phone interview questions both for the candidate and those that might be asked of us. We will be conducting mock interviews in preparation.

In the next few weeks, candidate applications will be received by Canon Brian and Bishop Mary for their review. The next step will be forwarding them electronically to me. It will be my responsibility to forward them to the Search Committee members. Each member will read, score and discuss them all. We cannot tell you anything concerning the candidates. It is vital that our process remains confidential and it will. As we have information concerning where we are in the process, I will keep you informed within the bounds of confidentiality.

Some time in June, we expect to have received the first batch of applications. This is a time of high excitement and deep prayer.

From the Editor

have a calendar in my office that represents my somewhat twisted humour. It's a "de-motivational" calendar. As the name implies, it is the polar opposite of the cutesy-fluffy motivational posters we all see in

offices around the country. Motivational posters were very 1990s corporate team building tools that thankfully we seem to be outgrowing. This month's choice phrase is: "Fear: Until you have the courage to lose sight of the shore, you will not know the terror of being forever lost at sea." Personally I find this phrase more inspirational than depressing as I prefer to think of myself as a realist rather than a pessimist. Perhaps this is optimism at the heart of pessimism. Since it is very human to err, and then beg forgiveness; to be warned and proceed without regard, I have to agree with the poster. The fact of life seems to be that we are idyllic until something happens and then we understand the world.

Like the disciples in the fishing boat, we need reminding that though we may be lost at sea, we are never alone. Of course the disciples were lucky, they just woke Jesus up and he calmed the storm One classic interpretation of this particular passage (Mark 4:35-40) is: if you act as Jesus and simply command the chaos to "be still," then you will at least achieve some inner sense of peace and thus be less troubled by what is occurring. I attempt to do just that every time we have to deal with the County of Santa Cruz's planning department. If Jesus had to pull permits for his carpentry, permits and liability insurance for his Sermon on the Mount, not to mention paying the Romans for crowd control, this whole Christianity thing may never have gotten off the ground. Be still.

Rob and I are continuing our quest for simplicity in life. Simplicity in living arrangements by reducing our lives to what we consider the essentials. But more than that, simplicity in doing ourselves as much as we are able. When I look back at generations past, and some of our youth in church that are our future, I am constantly forced to wonder how we may continue to function as a society if we forget how to perform those simple manual tasks.

How much better would we all be if we learned just a little about how everything goes together in life? Case in point: clotted cream. If you are not familiar with clotted cream or "cream teas" allow me to explain. Clotted cream is unpasteurised cream that has been heated gently until clots form. It is technically a type of butter in that it is formed when the phospholipid membrane around the fats is broken allowing the milk fat to bind together. One serves it with scones or a Cornish split, and the addition of tea creates a "cream tea". The problem of course is that nobody really makes clotted cream themselves anymore, and it is near impossible to find in the United States in any form, so we decided to try our hand at the process which we discovered in *The* Book of the Farm from the early 1800s.

Essentially you go to Whole Foods, buy several pints of unpasteurised cream, then in a double-boiler you heat the cream to 190 degrees Fahrenheit and wait. Be careful to not exceed 200 degrees as the clotting will stop. As the yellowish clots form on the surface you skim them off and that's your clotted cream. Simple right? I encourage you to be a bit adventurous and try it yourself some time. Until you have the courage to lose sight of the shore...

Financial Update

We've met as a congregation as we prepared ourselves to search for a new rector. We've identified who we are, what we're looking for in our new priest, and where we want to go as a family of God. We are preparing ourselves to invite that person who will be our new rector into our midst. We've all done a great job working together to do this work, and our new ECA website shows the results of that collaborative spirit. There is still work to be done, and working together, we can make ECA ready to launch a new journey of faith with our new priest.

Part of the work that needs to be done is to keep ECA financially sound in order to give our new rector a healthy start. As you noticed in our Annual Report, we are faced with a deficit budget. As of April 30th, the shortfall for 2010 is projected to be about \$17,000, accounting for current income and operational expenses. This includes the cost of running our church programs, supporting Joint Venture, and paying Father Frank. We are currently exploring ways to reduce this deficit.

The chart shows our income and expenses so far for this year. The Difference column shows the percentage difference between how we're actually doing (Year to date) and how we expected to do (2010 Budget). This is a "health index" of sorts for our finances so far this year. You could say we have a bad cold at this point.

Why do we have this deficit budget? Good question!

When we started looking for our interim pastor, we found that we needed to increase our compensation for the priest we hire to meet the diocesan guidelines. We have done this for Father Frank. That pretty much accounts for the difference from last year's budget. We will continue to pay a comparable wage for our new rector, knowing that health care costs could be higher if our new rector has a family. This could be a major challenge for next year.

We also have an unfunded budget item for Search Committee expenses of \$24,000. This money, needed to do our search, includes visiting candidate priests, having finalists visit ECA, and providing moving expenses for our new rector. In addition to our \$17,000 budget shortfall, that gives us a combined deficit for 2010 of \$41,000.

The other financial challenge we have is the renovation of the rectory. This fall is the perfect time

to upgrade our rectory, allowing us to provide modest and durable upgrades that will increase its value and make it a more inviting place for our new rector to live.

We estimate that we will need \$60,000 to do this work. The money for this project would be borrowed from our investment accounts and paid back over time. We will provide more information as we develop this rectory renovation plan.

Financial Update

How can we meet these financial challenges? I'm glad you asked!

For 2010, we have 68 individuals or households that are pledging money to ECA. If every one of our "pledging units" gave a one-time offering of 15% to 20% of their annual pledge, we could cover this shortfall. For example, "Dick and Jane Smith" contribute \$4000 annually. 15% of that \$4000 is \$600, and 20% is \$800. Dick and Jane plan to pay their extra offering over the summertime, in addition to their regular pledge payments.

That would be the easy solution, but it might be unrealistic in these recessionary times. We are asking for your help with whatever increase you can afford. In addition, if you are not currently pledging, we ask you to reevaluate your ability to do so. Let Hank DeVoss (408) 268-2799 or Doug Dunham (408) 281-0468 know, and we'll get you started.

There will be a parish forum covering these matters on June 13th after each of the services. Members of the Finance and Stewardship Direction committee will talk about our current budget issues and solutions, and we will answer any questions you might have. Please join us then.

Discovery Day

iscernment Ministry is a lifelong process of attending, perceiving, listening, and discovering how best to express Christ's ministry through the Church.

Once each year, the Commission on Ministry sponsors a workshop on discernment. This Day of Discovery offers the opportunity for those already engaged in active ministry to renew their call to a particular ministry, or to explore new ways to respond to God's call. Although this Day of Discovery is a required first step to anyone discerning a call to ordained ministry, it is in no way limited to such individuals. We explore and celebrate the ministry of all the baptized, and look at ministry development in each of the four orders - laity, deacons, priests, and bishops. Everyone would benefit from engaging in this process. Previous participants in the "Day of Discovery" have used such words as rejuvenating, validating, and transformative to describe their experiences.

Following the Day of Discovery workshop, participants may choose to take on a self-guided twelve-week exploration to enhance their appreciation of how the four orders of ministry complement each other in fulfilling the mission of the Church, and discern where they fit into that mission. Members of the Commission on Ministry provide support as people work their way through this program. It is required of anyone seeking ordination to the diaconate or priesthood but is also of great value for those who are exploring their call in the lay order.
