From the Rector

March begins in the church calendar with St David's Day on March 1. St David is the patron saint of Wales, so his day has served for centuries as a celebration of Welsh nationality (and their struggles against the English). Welsh men and women wear daffodils or leeks on this day as a symbol of Welsh pride. David, or Dewi Sant, was a teacher and an ascetic, and started a Celtic monastic community where St David's cathedral now stands in Pembrokeshire, Wales. He died on March 1 in 589 (or thereabouts). In his last sermon, David is remembered as telling his followers, 'Be joyful, and keep your faith and your creed.'

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From the Rector

Do the little things that you have seen me do and heard about.’

St David’s words sound like a good message for our Lent: ‘Do the little things.’ Sometimes we can get lofty ideas about what we’re supposed to do, following Jesus. We can make it into an all-or-nothing deal, something we’ve got to get right or not at all, as if to be good Christians we must leave everything in our life and do something completely different. Sometimes people pursue ordination or monastic vows with this mindset. Or more often, we go lofty in another sense: we sequester God in the ‘spiritual’ part of our lives, not having much effect on what we do Monday-Friday. God, we think, is interested in prayer and church, not the little stuff of everyday life. All of that somehow falls outside of the purview of our life of faith.

But Lent is a time for tuning in again in the little things. God calls us to be disciples here and now, in the midst of what we’re doing. That takes a variety of forms. It may be that like the first disciples and their fishing boats, there are things we’re supposed to leave behind in order to follow Jesus. We might need to ask ourselves, are there habits or things we spend our time on that distract us from loving God and our neighbor? When we take an honest assessment of how we divide up our time every day, we can get an accurate take of how our priorities are shaped right now – not what we think they ought to be, but what they currently truly are. It might help to write down a log of where our time goes, and then to look at it after a week goes by. Who is losing out in our allocation of time and energy? Is it our family? Or our work colleagues? Our friends? Maybe even the nourishment of our own selves? What kind of time are we giving to prayer and the reading of scripture? What kind of time are we giving to playing ‘Angry Birds’ on our iPhone? In

other words, when we look at the little things, we might see things it would behoove us to give up, to be in better balance and love more fully.

And it might also be that some of our little things can be done more lovingly than they are now. Diana Butler Bass, a church historian and sociologist, led a conference in our diocese last fall and talked about the emerging ‘spiritual but not religious’ category in American culture. She challenged churches to consider whether some of the ‘religious’ things we do – things that keep the institution of the church going, like vestry meetings, newsletter articles, budgets, etc. – could be done more ‘spiritually.’ In other words, she pointed out that we can get caught up in little things that are meant to be about God and neighbor, but find we’re doing them for their own sakes instead. Remembering the purpose of church work – remembering the purpose of all of our lives – can help us attend to the little things that have to get done in a way that glorifies God. As Brother Lawrence tells us in *The Practice of the Presence of God*, every single little thing in our lives, ‘spiritual’ or not, can be done to the glory of God. Doing our taxes, sweeping our floors, caring for aging parents, driving to work, all of it can be done with love and prayer. It’s in the little things that our faith shows its mettle.

And, I might add, St David’s other reminder is in that first phrase: Be joyful. In all things, Paul tells us in 1 Thessalonians, give thanks. Lent is a spring-time season, after all – no matter the complexity of our lives or the struggles of our spirits, there is always something to rejoice in. So I wish you a happy Lent, and I mean it.

From the Editor



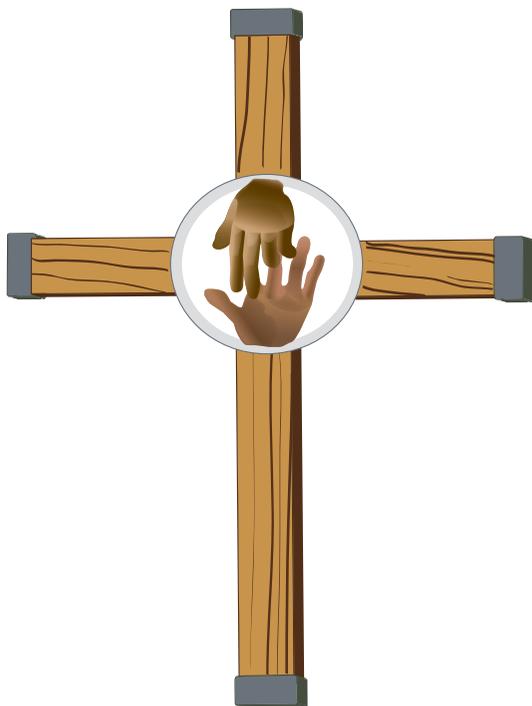
A wise person once told me “if you should find yourself in a hole, the first thing you should do is stop digging.” Oh how I should have listened.

March marks the one year anniversary of our grand move to our new microscopic home in the woods. While I still embrace the philosophy of “reduced footprint living”, like everyone else in our modern society we have run out of space. (This probably has something to do with two adults living in 550 square-feet, but what do I know?) Part of our problem is that our house is far from “done”, and the other part is we have 50 chickens laying several dozen eggs a day and we need to put another refrigerator somewhere. 

Vacation Bible School

We will offer VBS to children from the age of 4 through completing 5th grade. So mark your calendars and share the news. Registration forms and advertising plans will be set to go by March 1st.

We will be writing our own program this year and of course, including some new aspects that we haven't offered in the past. For example, we will be offering an extended afternoon program to accommodate working moms and dads. We will include an "out-reach component" and contribute to Montgomery Meals on June 15th. We can also freeze some of our contributions to be used for the Shelter Feeding of CCAVUCC. We also are hoping to have a JV BBQ and Fellowship Event for Friday, June 15th, with the intent of inviting new families that might be part of our VBS to come and meet us all.

Yes, this all may seem a bit ambitious. But, with all the wonderful talent and spirit within our congregations we think it is very possible. Wouldn't you love to be part of this exciting creation? Here's how: first, we need a few people who would like to develop our program with us. We plan to do "learning centers" so if you are especially talented in cooking, music, art, drama, storytelling, puppetry, science, games or worship, come help us plan activities for that center around our theme and selected scripture verses.

We need volunteers to help with our program during the hours from 9 AM to 12 noon each day of VBS week. Give us whatever time you can. Let me

know what days and times and centers would work best for you and I will schedule you at your convenience. Our goal is to have at least 30 attendees so we will want at least 3 "guest teachers" to run 3 centers simultaneously, and 3 shepherds to support them during the official VBS time.

Students needing "community service hours" can volunteer to work with us. If your school requires your community service hours to be approved beforehand, bring me the paperwork as soon as possible so we can get it and you approved.

We will need special help and assistance with organizing the JV BBQ event. We might need special help making teaching materials and gathering miscellaneous supplies. We will want help walking our neighborhood in March to pass out flyers advertising our VBS. We would enjoy having extra volunteers as needed for our afternoon care program. We will want help for things we have yet to think of at the writing of this notice.

If you would like to be part of this exciting program for our churches this year, please contact me as soon as you feel called. Let's get this undertaking underway so that it can be the best VBS possible for us and for those who attend. Happy 40th JV!

On February 11, 1972, the Articles of Incorporation for the Joint Venture Churches of Almaden were filed with the office of the Secretary of State of California (Edmund G. Brown, Jr., as it happens).

That action followed at least 5-6 years of sharing space, thinking about making it permanent, figuring out the pitfalls, etc. Kind of like a courtship before the engagement.

The 1972 document solidified that “marriage”. To my knowledge, there is no other like it. Yes, many churches share their space, but none actually own the premises together.

So, this is the 40th anniversary of that union. Through those years, we have survived a number of clergy, most of whom started out skeptical; growth or decline of one congregation or the other; dealing with the differences in denominational cultures and requirements; building a larger space; in short, the things that making living together interesting, as well as demanding.

A 40th anniversary is something to celebrate, give thanks for, and offer prayers for continued understanding and fellowship as we move toward 50 and beyond.

Service Flowers

Do you enjoy the flowers at our worship services? Would you like to share in providing the Flowers? If you've ever wondered how the flowers "work" here's the skinny.

You are probably aware that the flowers are provided by members of both of the congregations and that there is a sign up for flower contributions on the Joint Venture board in the Fellowship Hall.

We find that many Sundays go by with no one signed up to provide flowers. In this event, flowers are provided by the ECA Altar Guild and have to be paid for by one of the congregations (January to June by CCAVUCC, July to December by ECA).

An informal survey finds that people would like to sign up more often but the logistics of getting the flowers to the church gets in the way. So, in an effort to encourage you to sign up, we have come up with a new plan.

On the sign up sheet are two columns and you can choose what works best for you.

Column 1: "I will Provide." You will provide the flowers yourself. The arrangement must be in place for the 7:30 a.m. ECA Service on Sunday. Flowers may be placed in the sanctuary as early as Thursday afternoon. Reminder: the church is closed on Friday and Saturday. Flowers may be purchased by you or come from your own garden.

Column 2: "I will Pay." Simply sign up and check this option and the flowers will be provided and you will receive a bill for payment. The arrangements are small and Jenny Hoyt from ECA has agreed to provide the flowers for \$20 - \$35 and will deliver them to the sanctuary. Call Jenny by Wednesday (408) 997-1826 to make arrangements. It couldn't be simpler!

You may sign up for any Sunday in the year. Sign-ups do not reflect either congregation, just the responsibility for payment when there are no sign-ups. We hope you will help enrich our worship with flowers in the sanctuary.
