From the Rector

Dear Friends

Recently, I read, “Humberto Maturana, a Chilean biologist says, ‘Love is the only emotion that increases the intelligence of the system.’ In other words, any system organized around love increases that system’s intelligence and connection.” This quote is from “The love economy: How we help women survivors heal and thrive at Thistle Farms” by The Rev. Becca Stevens, Episcopal priest, social entrepreneur, and founder of Thistle Farms in Nashville, TN., a place for healing and a new start for female victims of abuse and trafficking, addiction, or prison. Systems organized around *Love* increase in intelligence and connection. But then, as Christians, we knew that! God invented the Love Economy.

It is interesting to me that this principle is noted by both a biologist and a social entrepreneur/priest. The latter, Becca Stevens, found when she began looking for ways to create space for women to heal and recover, to rediscover their worth and dignity, that a sustainable way to do this was to create justice enterprises. These enterprises are win-win solutions for giving people dignified labor in an atmosphere of acceptance and love. And Stevens has found that there is a dramatically growing consumer base interested in cause branding...people who want their purchases to support freedom, independence, and dignity. This appears to be especially strong among Millennials.

At ECA, we are extending and intensifying the discernment that led us to offer Kids’ Camps during school holidays, operate a neighborhood Pumpkin Patch, work together with other organizations to create a broad-based community organizing group, and offer a Day Center to the homeless women of Village

House. Collectively, we listened respectfully to the movement of the Holy Spirit among us, and we were led into all these transformative ministries. The Vestry is now opening ourselves to more discernment of where the Spirit of God is leading us next.

What are the new ways in which God’s Creative Spirit will guide us in being Church? Will our spiritually grounded, risk-taking, inclusive, community-oriented fellowship (those are our values) find a way to create a new Love Economy? Justice enterprises? This is Silicon Valley...the air here is filled with the spirit of creating something new. The very founding of the “Joint Venture” churches, 50 years ago, was a bold, new undertaking. Your Vestry invites you all to join us in this openness to the excitement and creativity of God in our midst.

Vestry Update

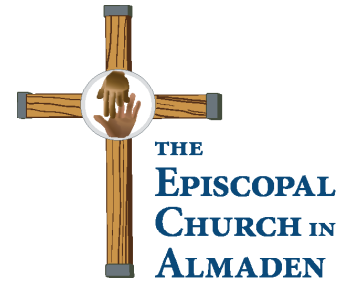

The bulk of the meeting was spent discussing the first two chapters of a book the Vestry is reading, *Becoming a Blessed Church*, by N. Graham Standish. First, the group discussed the ways in which ECA already has the marks of being a blessed church and then suggested steps we can take to become more open and guided by the spiritual dimension.

Marianne then asked the Vestry to discern what is God’s will as concerns the rich resources we have available to us and to especially think about the land the Joint Venture owns. Shelley and Marianne have had several discussions with the CCAVUCC leadership on this topic and its something that both churches would like to spend time thinking and praying about.

Our camp this month, "Nature's Gift, Joy and Peace," has been a wonderful collaboration creating a most exciting week for children in our neighborhood. Rachael Parakh did an amazing job creating an enriching program for our campers to explore nature and the natural resources we all need to care for and preserve for our future. Shelley selected Bible stories to coincide with our daily themes to help our campers connect God's word with creation and our daily lives. On the curriculum side my job was to balance activities and be sure we had variety that suited our different age groups from kindergarten to 5th grade with a preponderance of boys.

Camp enrollment this summer of 32 campers, is 20 boys to 12 girls. How lucky we are to have 4 high school young men to be counselors: Andrew Shahtout & Andrew Thorne from Leland, Aaron Fenton from Bellarmine, and Jack Ulrich from Willow Glen, Doug and Betty Wood's grandson. A former camper and middle schooler, Prestin Krisman is joining us as a "training counselor." Thankfully we also found 3 exceptional high school girls to join us: Natalie Khayo, a home schooler and part time Leland student, Ava Yazdanfar from Leland, and Natasha Denton, a former camper, also at Leland. We offer our high school students community ser-

vice hours for their commitment to our camp week.

Everyday we try to have something special happening for our campers. On Monday we will be creating our camp t-shirt. Going along with our theme of light we will be doing sun prints on our shirts using acrylic fabric paints and nature leaves and flowers. Tuesday one highlight will be our hike to the creek. Helping us with this experience will be guests from the San Jose Environmental Department with their program Creek to Classroom. On Wednesday "flora" will take center stage with lots of beautiful colors and smells. Thursday a beekeeper will find his way to camp as we focus on insects and all they do for us. A tasting treat of honey will make snack time even more special. Friday, our week will wind down bird watching and being grateful for all the beauty of this earth. At the end of this month you should be able to see many of our highlights in photo form on our bulletin board.

Of course, this camp as all our camps requires lots of adult help with our many centers and activities. Appreciation Sunday

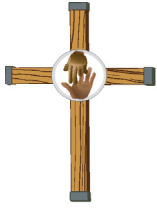

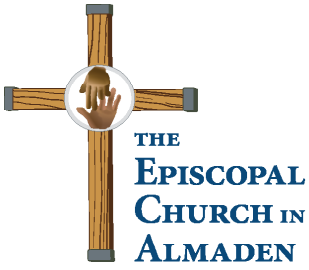
