From the Rector

#### **Dear Friends**

Tenri Nouwen, Dutch mystic and theologian, had This to say about God's generosity:

"God is a god of abundance, not a god of scarcity. Jesus reveals to us God's abundance when he offers so much bread to the people that there are twelve large baskets with leftover scraps (see John 6:5-15), and when he makes his disciples catch so many fish that their boat nearly sinks (Luke 5:1-7). God doesn't give us just enough. God gives us more than enough: more bread and fish than we can eat, more love than we dared to ask for.

God is a generous giver, but we can only see and enjoy God's generosity when we love God with all of our hearts, minds, and strength. As long as we say, 'I will love you, God, but first show me your generosity,' we will remain distant from God and unable to experience what God truly wants to give us, which is life and life in abundance."1

I think the question of what "God truly wants to give us" is a source of much confusion for Christians. Some think it is prayers answered as we wish. Others think it is a life free of pain and suffering. But, believing this way can lead us to disappointment – and a loss of faith.

As I ponder what God wants to give us, I realize that it is relationship...a relationship so deep and reliable, so genuinely loving, satisfying, and free of self-interest, that it forms us into the most that we can be. This is a life-long endeavor...a life-long dance of love in which we are woven ever more closely to the dynamic, shared love of the Holy Trinity. This intimacy and growth characterize the abundant life God desires to share with us.

And as we grow in this relationship - this abundant life spreads out to those around us. In Genesis, God tells Abraham that he is "blessed to be a blessing." This was our theme at our last Let's ROC. God blesses us with abundance, and we use that abundance - material and spiritual - to bless others. In this way, the Reign of God is built among us.

How do we increase our ability to "see and enjoy God's generosity?" We ask God to help us open ourselves to God's presence and action in our lives. We look to see how the Holy Spirit is moving among and within us. At ECA this year, we have asked parishioners once a month at the Sunday services to share how they have experienced this themselves. Hopefully, that will have stirred some similar thoughts in all of us.

May the joy of God's generosity move you this month. Blessings,

## Listening for God in the Silence

The Rev. Kate Flexer, in one of her sermons when she was at ECA, shared about going on a ten-day silent retreat. I wondered how anyone could be silent for ten days! I tried to envision the day's activities, such as eating with others around the table and no one talking. I was puzzled about the experience.

This summer I had the opportunity to go on a five-day silent retreat and found out first-hand what it is like to be silent that long. It took me a few days to silence the internal dialogue that goes on in my head, but I did find the silence to be refreshing. Sitting at the table for meals in silence was particularly rewarding. Praying and meditating came easier as I had "less on my mind" and could be open to God's Spirit.

Maryke Williams asked me if there is anything I am doing differently now that I have been to a silent retreat. Certainly we all have been to retreats where we feel closer to God, but the feeling fades as we resume our lives at home. I do look at "silence" differently now. When I find myself at home alone for a length of time, I don't always turn on the music to fill the silence. One day I silently meditated while cleaning our home, folding the laundry, and preparing dinner. I tried to be

open to God's spirit in the silence. Maybe what I am seeking is to learn how to listen in the silence and not feel like I always have to be entertained. It is a journey.


While talking about silent retreats with Maryke, she said the Episcopal Church in Nevada City, where they attend when they are at their cabin, has yearly weekend silent retreats. Perhaps silent retreats are not as unusual as I thought.

I read about a way to pray "in the moment." In his book, *The Divine Dance*, Richard Rohr, describes a prayer using the Hebrew form for the name of God, YHWH, which we usually translate as *Yahweh*. We can "breathe" the name of God as a prayer:

First inhale, saying, *Yah* and then exhale, saying, weh.

I often find myself sighing because of frustration, anger, disappointment or tiredness, so I try to add Yahweh to the sigh as I breathe. When I remember to do that, I bring God's love, wisdom and patience into the situation. It only takes a moment, and it provides me the opportunity to see the problem through God's eyes.

## Blessed to Be a Blessing

My standard invitation to and description of Let's ROC is this: "If you're looking for a place to rest with friends on a Saturday night, hear God in an unexpected way, be known, valued and called to care for those around you – Let's ROC is the place for you! Let's ROC – Reach Out in Community – is a welcoming and intergenerational community. We listen for God's voice, encounter God at the table and respond to God with love."

In August, Let's ROC was exactly this. Friends worked together making playdough for the preschool at Santa Maria Urban Ministry and writing our prayers of the people. We heard God in an ancient story, and in the stories of our friends. We were an intergenerational community of fifteen, gathered at the table.

Our theme was, "Blessed to Be a Blessing." The phrase came from the twelfth chapter of Genesis via our awesome and colorful backpack tags. gathered to hear the story of Abraham, Sarah, Isaac and Rebekah. At the beginning of this particular story, God tells Abram that he will become the father of a great nation and that the world will be blessed through him. The conclusion of the story reminded us that we are a part of the family of Abraham, and God asks

us to bring God's blessings into the world. There was a lot to the middle of the story though, there was lots of walking through the desert, finding God and wondering where God would be found.

Over the next few months we'll be working to share the blessings of this ECA community with our neighborhood and the wider world. The next Let's ROC is September 15th. Let's ROC will be an opportunity to invite and welcome neighbors and an opportunity to have life giving conversation with friends. We'll build community while we reach out to folks around us.

In October we'll be having a mini two day camp, Thursday October 4th and Friday October 5th, followed by honoring the Feast of Saint Francis by blessing an animals. I'm still looking for help for Friday the 5th. A wonderful way to share the blessing of this camp would be to share a registration form with a friend or neighbor. Watch for them in the narthex, and for a link you can share in the midweek.

One last blessing to share with you all, this month at "Let's ROC" my two-year-old daughter started talking during the Prayer of Thanksgiving. "It's like church," she said. Then she said, "it's like home." It is such a blessing to me that she is able to experience a church that feels like home. Please pray with me that we can invite and welcome more children to grow up in a home like ECA.

# Mission to the Virgin Islands

he Rev. David Starr recently spent six weeks on the island of Virgin Gorda, in the Virgin Islands. The island has a population of about 3000 people, almost all of who are descendants of slaves. He was there at the invitation of the Episcopal Diocese of the Virgin Islands, to provide relief to the supply clergy of the parish of St Mary the Virgin, in the British Virgin Islands. The parish and the island have been struggling to recover from Hurricane Irma last year, whose hurricane-force winds, along with 9 tornados, destroyed all green vegetation on

the island. In addition to the destruction from the storm, David found a parish traumatized by a lack of pastoral leadership and from conflict between the congregation and the current lay leadership.

David was able to help get the church services back into the main church building, giving them a semblance of return to normalcy. He also gained the bishop's approval to schedule a vestry election, in hopes that confidence between the congregation and lay leadership could be restored. On the eve of the church meeting, David admits he was worried, wondering whether the lay leadership situation might totally fall apart. But at the meeting, nine strong, dedicated women stepped forward to form a new vestry, a result David attributes to the working of the Holy Spirit. He has since been in contact with the bishop, who has visited the parish, and who reports that the church is now on solid footing, and he anticipates a strong relationship with St. Mary the Virgin in the future.


