From the Rector

Dear Friends

We have now moved out of Eastertide and into the Season after Pentecost – that long, green season that will take us all the way up to Advent. During Eastertide, we were able to contemplate the meaning of resurrection – or new life – for us as individuals and corporately as a congregation, in fact, as the Joint Venture Churches with our sister church, CCAV. With the celebration of Pentecost, we recognized the gift of the Holy Spirit, not only to those first apostles, but to all God’s people throughout time...including us. What a perfect place to find ourselves in the liturgical life of the church as we move ahead with work toward becoming the Church of the Future: the confluence of promised new life with the gift of the empowering, creative Holy Spirit!

The Joint Venture Core Team has been working faithfully, meeting every two weeks to plan, evaluate, and brainstorm. A strategic plan is being created now. We have also worked hard to make sure that everyone in both congregations is up to speed with the results of our work. Please be sure that you attend coffee hour meetings via Zoom as you are able and read the Shape each month and the semi-weekly Wednesday and Friday Messages that come to your email. These are the primary avenues of communication for ECA. We will also send written letters to each household from time to time, and hold congregational meetings, which for now will have to be via Zoom, as we have important information to share.

With the approval of ECA’s Vestry, CCAV’s Council, and the Joint Venture Board, the Joint Venture Core team interviewed and selected a consulting firm, DCG Strategies, to work with us as we determine what actual possibilities exist for creating new partnerships to serve our neighborhood and sustain our congregations. A contract with them has been signed, and they are doing the research for a land use survey for us now, which will be complete sometime this month. The information they bring us will help us move forward, knowing what is possible and what is not.

Our close work with CCAV on this project has been a joy. And I want to congratulate them on their calling of a Supply Pastor, The Rev. Dr. Shelly Wilson, who will begin on June 1st. (Yes, our congregations now share ordained leaders with the same name! Pastor Shelly, however, does not use the last “e”). She will be serving CCAC remotely from her new home in Colorado. Welcome, Pastor Shelly!

In this exciting season of the Holy Spirit guiding us into new life, deeper relationships, and more service to our neighbors, may you sense our shared call to live the Gospel in the place where we are planted.



Re-Entry: We Begin to Gather Again for Worship

The JV Board approved ECA's request to allow our congregation back into the sanctuary for Sunday services beginning this month. The building is still not fully open, so we will take it slowly and carefully, following the safety protocols we have adopted as well as the diocesan regulations for worship.

Beginning in June, our 10:45am service will be open to in person attendance every Sunday. It will also continue to be live-streamed each week. Everyone who attends must be masked and remain 6' from anyone not in their household for the entire time they are in the building – regardless of vaccination status. When people arrive, they must sign in and use hand sanitizer. The pews will be marked as to where people may sit. There will be no coffee hour, but you may visit in the parking lot after the service. The congregation may sing behind their masks. This will be a “hybrid” service, i.e., it will be live, in person and also live-streamed each week. Holy Eucharist will begin at this service on 6/20 and continue weekly thereafter. Zoom Coffee Hours will continue as long as people want them. The safety guidelines from the diocese will be eased as of California's 6/15/21 rollout of new rules, and we will know what these are soon. The 7:30am service is still on hold at this time.

We will also have one outdoor service of Holy Eucharist in June and one in July. At these services, masks will be optional for vaccinated people except when singing. Social distancing is encouraged.

- June 13 – 9am. This time was chosen to avoid afternoon heat and allow Shelley to be ready for the 10:45am indoor service.
- July 18 – 10:45am. This is the Bishop's Annual Visitation – only this outdoor service will be live-streamed and it will be the only service this day.

It is our desire to make sure everyone is safe, included, and welcome! If you have questions or concerns, please speak with me or our Senior Warden, Nancy Romer.

I thank you for your patience, and I truly appreciate the work of the Re-Entry Team (Ellen Lukanc, chair, Elizabeth Guichard, Anna Spanjaart, Susanne Moore, and myself). Without their faithful, careful, and detailed planning, we would not be ready to begin to gather for worship.

May Vestry Notes

The May Vestry meeting was held May 13 via Zoom. Marianne Schmidt led an opening prayer and silent meditation. Nancy Romer then led a Lectio Divina based on 1 Samuel 17:38-49.

The business meeting began with a financial review. Income this Spring has been lighter than previous years, but we are still at 118% of revenue. Expenses are 101% of budget, and Ruthanne has sufficient money in the checking account to pay the bills. The Vestry thanked Ruthanne for getting the financial reports out a week before the meeting and the Wings for continuing to count on a monthly basis.

The JV Board approved Bryan Bond's proposal to relocate the live-streaming equipment to accommodate Covid-safe in-person sanctuary seating. It will occupy the top row of the center seating area. The Board also authorized the JV President to sign the contract with DCG Strategies so that the consultants can undertake their initial investigation of the options for the "church of the future".

Nancy Romer, Joyce Wing and Debbie Bemis met with the head of the Hearts and Minds organization, which is re-opening in June and will begin working on a new 5-year plan with emphasis on growth. Maria re-confirmed her commitment to helping us in our development of the "church of

the future", although no commitments were made on either side.

Work continues on building our new website. The primary target for the site will be new people who are looking for a church and community. The secondary target is our members. There will be a members-only section, which will be password protected.

Nancy Romer and Susanne Moore visited Santa Maris Urban Ministries recently and thanked Shelley for her clear reporting on their findings in the weekly messages. They need financial contributions, socks and underwear.

The re-entry team has determined that we can begin meeting indoors and in person as long as masks are worn and we maintain social distancing. Ellen Lukanc will present to the JV Board our request to begin holding services in the sanctuary in June. Shelley will print the worship schedule in the weekly messages and on the church door. We will need greeters, ushers and Altar Guild for these services so the Vestry encourages all who are willing to help out to let the leads know. Alain Guichard is the new head usher. Joan Wagner remains the head of Altar Guild.

The Bishop will visit us on July 18. For that service we will hold an outdoor, live-streamed service at 10:45 a.m.

Our sister church, CCAV-UCC, has hired a new interim pastor, who will start in June. She will work remotely 20 hours per week. As her name is Shelly, she will be

known as Pastor Shelly. Shelley Denney will be known as Reverend Shelley.

We Miss the Willards

We miss Dorothy and Warren Willard. Warren passed away on February 22, and Dorothy followed Warren to heaven on April 6, 2021. They were a unique couple to say the least. Private, kind, involved, devoted to God and each other. Their complete story may never be known, but here are some things Gayle and I had learned over the years.



Both were born in San Francisco, and grew up in the Sunset District. Although they lived two blocks away from each other, they never knew each other until who knows what brought them together. Warren delivered newspapers as a youngster, regardless of the weather. Early mornings to a spot to pick-up his papers, fold them in such a way that he could throw them on someone's porch, and they wouldn't fly all over the place.

Warren said that he had two apartments he had to deliver the papers to, and he developed strong legs walking up the flights of stairs. Then, once a month he would make his rounds to collect his money for the deliveries. Do some of you recall those days?

When "The War" (also known as World War II) broke out, Warren signed up for the Army Air Corps, the forerunner of the Air Force. He was a Crew Chief, a job that Gayle's father held during the war. At the same time, Dorothy was honing her skills on the tennis court. She was, by her own admission, quite the competitor and quite good at the sport.

Warren and Dorothy married after Warren's hitch in the service, and Warren found a job selling class rings, and caps and gowns. The area he covered was mostly in San Francisco, but soon took him to serving students in the five western states. Eventually he found it easier to just deal with central and Northern California. They had two children, a boy and a girl.

Gayle and I, along with our two sons Scott and Jonathan, joined ECA in 1984. A lot was happening at ECA at the time, and there was some turmoil afoot. As typical with ECA, I was new and was asked to participate in a search for a new priest. That is where I met and had the pleasure of working with Warren and Dorothy. They joined the committee sharing one vote. Our group was responsible for presenting three candidates to

the Vestry, and they chose Father Nolan Redman as our next rector.

We found a couple of friends in the Willards. Warren had become the Head Acolyte, and recruited our sons to be trained by Warren in their new role at church. Well, Scott became one of Warren's acolytes, and Jonathan said he'd carry one of the candles, but that was it for him. Warren wouldn't give up, but tried to get Jonathan on board, always in a nice way. Warren trained several of our youth to be acolytes.

Being the successful ring salesman, he learned of one of our young high school graduates who had not ordered a class ring. Warren presented a class ring to this young man. That's the kind of man that he was. He didn't want to see anyone left out.

Warren and Dorothy liked to travel and had their favorite places. One of the places they frequented was the Little River Inn, just outside of Fort Bragg, Ca. They found out that Gayle and I were going to visit there, and they had a bottle of wine delivered to our room upon our arrival. They also liked to cruise. However, their idea of cruising was a little different than ours. You see, they liked to book passage on freighters. No music, no dancing performers, no casinos, no swimming pools. Yep. One of those kinds of cruises. I asked Warren, "well, what do you do then, if it is just you and the crew?" He said that they liked to

read, and read a lot. They suggested we try it some time.

In 1988, or there about, there was a young man named Mike, who was renting a room from Carol Hoyt, one of our founding members at ECA. I convinced Mike to go with me and we'd start a Sunday after-service BBQ during the summer months. This was successful, then Mike transferred out of the area for his work. Warren and I talked about it and he joined me at the BBQ. We'd get together the Friday before the event, do the shopping, and get ready for the Sunday event. Warren was a hard worker, but I could tell that he was beginning to slow down. Well, after 30 years together, he decided to step aside.

The Willards didn't venture out, even church or bible Study, if they weren't looking or feeling their best. As time went on, we saw less of the Willards in church or church events. Gayle and I wanted them to know that they were still being thought of and that we loved them.

We stayed in touch with Warren and Dorothy with cards, phone calls, and some personal visits. Dorothy had a couple of health issues that resulted in hospital stays. Warren never discussed what had happened, and was adamant about no visitors. We honored that.

A few recent calls after Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter, I had the pleasure of speaking with Dorothy. She was always up and happy. We laughed a lot. She'd say, "Well, here I'll let you talk to your buddy". Then, Warren and I'd spend some time on the phone. Sometime in March, I phoned the Willards just to say hello, see how they were doing, and offering to do what I could to help them out. Dorothy answered the phone and we talked a lot. She didn't ask if I wanted to "talk to my buddy". I asked how Warren was doing, and she replied, "Oh, he's not doing so good".

A few weeks ago, we had returned from a road trip and I got a call from Shelley. She found out that Warren and Dorothy had died.

Unfortunately and unexplained, no one at ECA was notified about their passing. The question of "Why" will probably never be known, but we have to honor that. And, I can only believe that was their wish and desire. It wasn't to disrespect any of us that prayed, laughed, and cooked with Dorothy and Warren, that was just the way they wanted it.

Our only hope is that they didn't suffer and transitioned peacefully. We will miss you, Warren and Dorothy Willard, and will see you on the other side some day.

Working Together As One Status Update

At our May 4 meeting, we discussed how both of the congregation's meetings went on April 25th at the coffee hours. In general, both meetings went well, there were good questions, discussions and responses to questions. Both meetings were very positive. Some have stronger feelings regarding change than others, but the majority seemed to feel the change would be good and that the JV Core Team is going in a good direction and pace. The Land Use Analysis portion of the project is underway, more information to be provided early June.

Nancy Romer, Debbie Bemis and Joyce Wing had a zoom meeting with Maria Nicolacoudis, Director of Hearts and Minds, to check in. Their organization is opening back up for in person service in June, they have built a new building to provide care to 60 newly diagnosed patients who will receive on-site care and programs that help prolong their quality of life. They are going to develop their new five-year- strategic plan with the emphasis on growth. They will be reaching out to faith-based organizations as part of this effort. Maria reaffirmed her commitment in helping to guide us, with

no commitments on either side for future partnership but to keep the dialog continuing. She felt our approach was good and that the Land Use Analysis our consultant is doing is a very good start. She was asked if she wanted to provide their classes for caregivers at our site, and she was very open to that idea. More discussion to come. It was a very good, informative and positive meeting.

Tales From the Kitchen, with Alain Guichard: Salade Lyonnaise

One of my favorite salads is named for the French city where it was invented, the Salade Lyonnaise. Lyons is the second largest urban area in France (after Paris, of course) and is known as the food capital of France. It has one of the highest concentrations of restaurants per capita in the country. In fact, in 1935, the famed food critic Curnonsky did not hesitate to describe the city as the "world capital of gastronomy".

One of the most famous chefs from Lyon, and a hero of mine, is Paul Bocuse, whose picture is shown to the right.

The salad is a hearty one. It's not the simplest salad to make, but it has a wonderful combination of flavors and textures, including bitter greens, crisp pancetta, eggs and a warm vinaigrette.

Ingredients: (serves 2)


- 4 cups frisee lettuce (about 4 oz.), torn into large bite-sized pieces
- 2 ounces of diced pancetta
- 1 tablespoon white vinegar
- 2 large eggs, as fresh as possible
- 1 medium shallot, finely minced
- 1 tablespoon red wine vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- salt and pepper to taste

Instructions:

- Place the frisee into a large mixing bowl.
- Place a small skillet over medium heat and cook the pancetta, stirring occasionally, until golden brown. Carefully remove the pan from the heat and use a slotted spoon to transfer the pancetta pieces to a paper towel to drain and cool. Keep the pan and its rendered fat.
- To poach the eggs, fill a saucepan with 4 inches of water and add the white vinegar. Bring the mixture to a gentle simmer. Break each egg into a small bowl. With a slotted spoon, stir simmering water to create a whirlpool, then slide the first egg into an eye of the swirl. Using the back of the spoon, immediately push the solidifying whites around the yolk, coaxing them to stay close to the yolk. Repeat with the second egg. Simmer the eggs for 3 minutes. Gently remove each egg with the slotted spoon and reserve in a bowl of warm water. Trim off any straggling pieces of cooked egg white.
- Reheat the skillet with the rendered pancetta fat over medium heat. Add the shallots and cook, stirring for 30 seconds. Add the red wine vinegar and mustard and swirl to combine. Add the pancetta pieces and swirl. Immediately pour the hot dressing over the greens and toss. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
- Divide the salad between 2 bowls and top each with a

poached egg. Season the eggs with additional salt and pepper, if desired. Serve immediately.
